Working with perpetrators and victims of family violence: perspectives, evidence, and risk management practices

Family violence is a broad phenomenon involving psychological, physical and sexual violence between partners, siblings, parents, children and more distant family members. This workshop aims to be both informative and practical for clinicians working with offenders and/or victims of family violence. It will provide an overview of the current research and evidence base regarding understanding, assessing and managing risk in family violence cases. This will include an overview of existing evidence and theoretical perspectives, empirically-validated risk assessment approaches, and gaps in current knowledge and service provision. Practical approaches to gathering risk-relevant information from both victims and perpetrators will be explored, with an emphasis on "asking difficult questions", and strategies for both perpetrator risk management and victim safety planning.

Dr Melisa Wood is a Clinical and Forensic Psychologist and a Senior Psychologist at Forensicare. She is experienced in working with both victims and perpetrators of family violence and providing consultation to Victoria Police Family Violence Teams in relation to risk assessment and management.

Dr Troy McEwan is a Clinical and Forensic
Psychologist and a Senior Psychologist at Forensicare,
and a Senior Lecturer at the Centre for Forensic
Behavioural Science at Swinburne University. She
conducts research in stalking and family violence and
is currently consulting with Victoria Police to improve
approaches to assessing risk in family violence cases.
She is co-author of the Stalking Risk Profile.

Balancing risk and engagement in an occupationally focused manner — strategies and skills for occupational therapists working in mental health

Thursday 22 June 2017 9:30am - 1pm

This workshop is aimed at occupational therapists working with clients experiencing mental health difficulties and challenging behaviours. These clients may have had contact with, or be at risk of contact with, the criminal justice system, or their participation in occupation requires consideration of significant risk factors. Through the use of occupational therapy and mental health models of practice, we will explore strategies to support the engagement of clients in meaningful occupation, including positive risk taking.

In addition, occupational therapists often have the role of exposing clients to tools and equipment that may be considered dangerous. This training will examine personal safety issues and provide a brief overview of basic tips and tricks for staying safe, whether on the ward or in a community setting, whilst maximising function and participation in everyday occupations using tools.

Marissa Davidson-Blue is Chief Occupational Therapist at Forensicare.

Danielle Ashley is Senior Occupational Therapist at Forensicare, working with the Mobile Forensic Mental Health Service at the Metropolitan Remand Centre.
